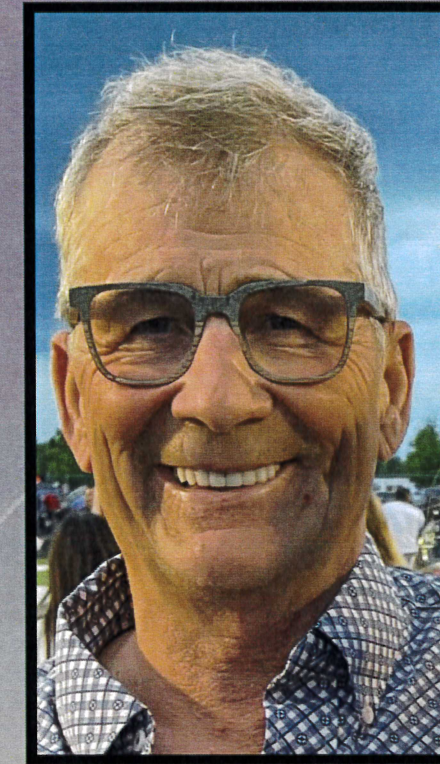

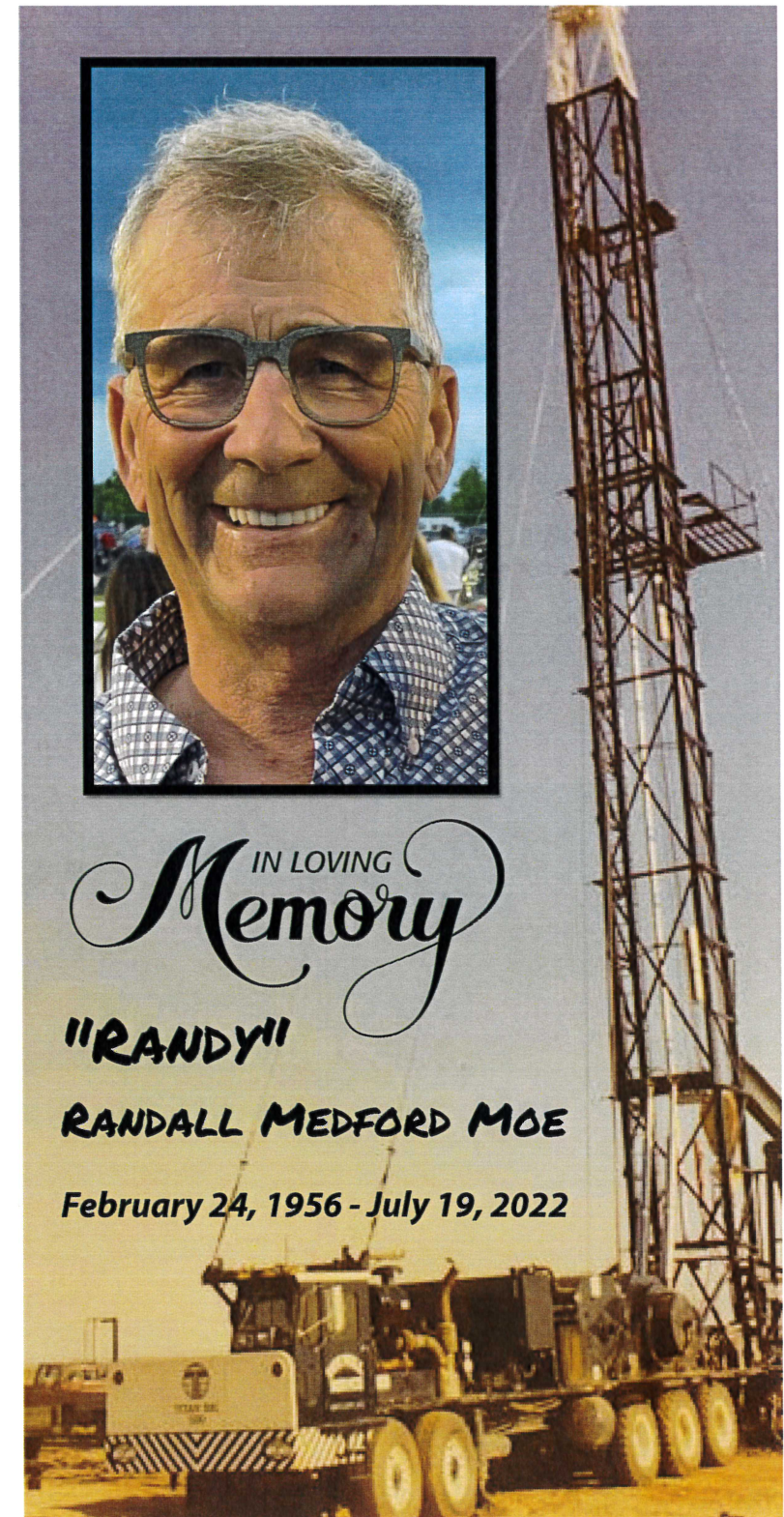

Randy had many interests outside of work. He enjoyed golfing, hunting, camping, fishing, boating, and storytelling with anyone and everyone.

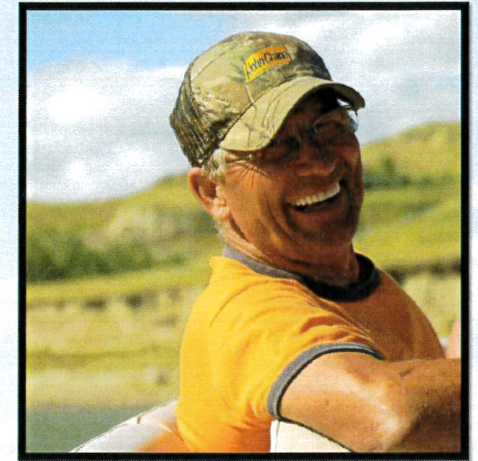
